

BTVI RECEIVES OUTSTANDING IT LEADERSHIP AWARD


A "perennial leader," exemplifying the "highest commitment" to educating and certifying IT students.

The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) was recognized in 2020 as the **Computing Technology Industry Association's (CompTIA)**, leading learning partner in the Caribbean and Latin America.

According to CompTIA's Director of Latin America and the Caribbean, Leonard Wadewitz, BTVI has won the award for several reasons including teaching a comprehensive program, which includes several certifications, in addition to its commitment to a complete CompTIA program which develops new IT professionals.

CompTIA took special note of BTVI's **Information and Communication Technology (ICT) program**. Students heading into 10th grade, are given the opportunity to gain hands-on training, college credits and international certifications.

In 2017 and 2018, BTVI received the top award for the highest CompTIA certification scores out of 40 testing centres in the Latin America and Caribbean regions. BTVI has over 300 students taking CompTIA exams annually.

When COVID-19 hit The Bahamas in early 2020, Dr. Robertson led the charge in ensuring that the institution developed online classes to expand its reach to improve skills development throughout The Bahamas in a more flexible manner, which matches the needs of working professionals and the environment the world now finds itself in.

Certified Technical Training Begins on Moore's Island

Thirty residents of Moore's Island received accelerated training towards National Centre for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) certification.

Facilitated by the Bahamas
Technical and Vocational
Institute (BTVI) and Valencia
College in Florida, the first
phase of the training required
80 contact hours over a 20day period. NCCER develops
standardized construction and
maintenance curriculum and
assessments with portable
industry-recognized credentials.
Its core curriculum is a prerequisite for all NCCER training
and consists of nine modules.
Thirty laptops, a projector,

speakers and NCCER program booklets were bought with a portion of the proceeds from the RBC Race for the Kids held in January 2020.

BTVI's Dean of Construction and Workforce Development, Alexander Darville, noted that with Moore's Island being a fishing village off Abaco, many of the all age school students go fishing after graduating. He believes it is because of the lack of exposure to other skills.

Upon completion of the NCCER's core curriculum, students receive an NCCER wallet card and a certificate; they are entered into the NCCER's Automated National Registry

(ANR) from which future employers can verify student credentials.

Representing Valencia College during the training was Master Trainer and Construction Programs Manager, Mark Hughes.

Additionally, Ministry of Education, Abaco District Superintendent, Dominique Russell, expressed thanks to BTVI for connecting in such a major way with the people of Moore's Island.

Moore's Island, **Chief Councillor, Dalson Stuart**, recognized that BTVI is playing a role in empowering the young people.

Youth Complete Vocational Program

It was considered an "historic day," as the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) celebrated the first cohort of the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) core program.

After 80 contact hours, the participants – some of whom were high schoolers – were trained in general maintenance.

They learned the fundamentals of construction site safety, construction math, construction power tools, construction hand tools, communication skills, employability skills, construction drawing and material handling, with some of them choosing rigging as an option.

All modules had to be completed with a score of 70% or above in

order for students to pass the NCCER core credential.

Among the 30 participants at the drive-in completion ceremony on the grounds of Chapel on the Hill, Tonique Williams-Darling Highway, were some students of Teleos Christian Academy and the Ministry of Education's Jump Start program.

Cisco Partners with BTVI to Build Technology Hub

A government arrangement with United States-based networking solutions giant **CISCO**, will result in training for 100 local programmers.

Under the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the government and CISCO, the company will assist in:

- Providing knowledge and opportunities;
- Aid in strategy development for an Innovation Center in partnership with the University of The Bahamas Northern Campus;
- Offer technical guidance to the government on building a tech hub;
- Partner with the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) to train some 100 individuals in software development to build incountry talent based on CISCO standards.

Individuals will gain access to CISCO's talent bridge with a view to identifying possible job opportunities within CISCO and its partners.

CISCO's president for Latin America, Jordi Botifoll, noted that CISCO has already trained more than 2.5 million people in Latin America and added that developing local talent in the tech space will attract developers.

The Bahamas is making a huge step forward in its tech industry ambitions!

BTVI Alum Credits Study Abroad As 'Game Changer'

Gerrard Russell, a 2016 Information **Technology Management graduate** of the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) now works with a Managed Service Provider (MSP) company which oversees the IT infrastructure of several hundred companies in Ontario, Canada.

Reminiscing on his journey, Gerrard who



Computer Systems and Technology course at Fanshawe College in December 2019, acknowledged that BTVI was a stepping stone to where he is today. In 2014, he was one of five BTVI students afforded the opportunity to participate in the Emerging Leaders in the Americas Program (ELAP), receiving the opportunity to study in Canada.

For 11 consecutive years, BTVI has partnered with the Canadian government to award its students with study abroad exchanges. The most recent experience was in spring of this year, with colleges in Canada accommodating BTVI students for an extended stay when borders were closed because of the COVID-19 global pandemic.

It was that study abroad experience in 2014 that motivated Gerrard to go abroad for further study and training after he graduated from BTVI, although he admitted he did not know how he would afford it. However, it was a deeply embedded dream.

Thanks to the Lyford Cay Foundations, Gerrard - who fixed computers on the side to fund his way through BTVI - received a technical and vocational scholarship to Fanshawe College and was able to begin further studies in fall 2016.

Questioned as to whether he disadvantaged receiving an advanced diploma compared to a Bachelor's degree, Gerrard said not at all. The diploma focused on Cisco Networking, Windows and Linux Based Systems, Firewalls, Data Centre and Cloud Based Technologies, as well as several Security courses.

As the IT professional reflected on his journey from fixing computers on the side to help pay his BTVI school fees to gaining a scholarship to Fanshawe College and now working in Canada, he acknowledged that it was possible but for the grace of God, his determination and focus, and that study abroad experience which became a game changer.





BTVI Students Soaring in Web-based Math Classes

In the fall 2020 term, 87% of Math students at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) passed their courses. According to **Chair of the Math department, Ron Clarke**, this represented the highest pass rate in Math that BTVI has seen.

Mr. Clarke also indicated that the results were attributable to the use of **Assessment and LEarning in Knowledge Spaces (ALEKS)** and the hard work of the institution's faculty.

ALEKS is a web-based, artificially intelligent assessment and learning system. It uses adaptive questioning to quickly and accurately determine what a student knows and does not know in a Math course. In spring 2017, BTVI introduced ALEKS in its Math classes to help students learn and practice at their own pace. Since then, students' confidence and performance in the subject have significantly improved.

The system allows instructors to create lessons based on their course outlines. On the students' initial log in, they are given a knowledge test to assess what topics they have mastered and what topics they need to work on. Based on those results, ALEKS creates a personal learning plan that teaches and assesses students' mastery of content and skills. The system also regularly tests and retests the same skills to make sure that students retain knowledge.

BTVI President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson, expressed satisfaction with the effects ALEKS has had on BTVI's Math courses and plans to implement other resources to help students develop other necessary skills.

ALEKS is used to assist students in BTVI's Prep Math, MAT 0100, MAT 1100, College Algebra, Statistics, and Business Math courses, and is available 24/7 for students to learn at their own pace and in their own environments.



A key policy response advanced by The Bahamas government, has focused on the need to develop more capacity within the labour force; hence, the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) is pushing to achieve several outcomes, inclusive of accelerated trade courses and certifications.

A research paper jointly written by BTVI President, **Dr. Robert W. Robertson** and Dean of Construction and Workforce Development, **Alexander Darville**, for a publication of the **Florida Political Chronicle**, outlined efforts of the institution in advancing workforce skills, following the hurricane Dorian-ravaged northern islands, while simultaneously competing in a COVID-19 environment.

The accelerated trade courses model of shorter courses and programs is expected to enhance retention, graduation and output, while maintaining quality, according to the paper.


It was added that with the workforce also having shifted towards online platforms, there is now a reliance on short, specific, job-ready, professionally-certified courses and training.


BTVI quickly made the pivot to online education, once the pandemic hit The Bahamas in March 2020. The institution moved 450 courses to the **Moodle** learning management system within a three-day period. The online courses included case-studies, simulations, videos and Zoom classes.

The paper noted that although some classes in the trades are particularly difficult to accommodate, more than 95% of classes across the system continued online. To ensure student success, "boot camps" of small, face-to-face, hands-on, practical sessions, were held.

The authors concluded that a focus on short, industry-certified courses in the trades - using the NCCER model - is imperative in addressing the skilled worker shortage in The Bahamas,, underscoring though that it will take a united effort over time to close the skills gap and rebuild the country.

Construction Certification Training for West End and Bimini Residents

Fifty two residents of **West End and Bimini** have been trained in the fundamentals of construction by the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI).

The National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) training is in conjunction with Valencia College. The virtual training was in modules; therefore participants were able to build on their knowledge and skills at each level.

Upon successful completion of the core program, students received an NCCER wallet card and a certificate. The NCCER's core curriculum is a pre-requisite for all NCCER training.

BTVI's Dean of Construction Trades and Workforce Development, Alexander Darville, noted that the skills gap in the country is wide; hence, the importance of the NCCER program's accelerated training.

Credentials are tracked in the NCCER's national registry. The globally recognized and portable credentialing system allows organizations and companies to track qualifications of their craft professionals, which are stored in a secure database;

qualifications of possible new hires can also be verified.

President of BTVI, Dr. Robert W Robertson noted that the intention is to focus on short industry certified courses in construction and technology.

BTVI will roll out NCCER training to other areas of the country this year. In late 2020, 30 students of **Moore's Island** became recipients of accelerated training towards NCCER certification.



Rotary Club Invests in BTVI Virtual Reading Program

MindPlay Virtual Reading Coach is a technology-based reading solution that analyzes each student's strengths and weaknesses. It then builds a unique prescription plan for everyone. The interactive mastery-based activities help students stay focused and accelerate their progress. Each student works toward 100% mastery at his or her own pace, receiving unlimited support along the way.

RCEN's Chair of the Literacy Committee, Valentino Bethell, stated how impressed the club was after learning about the impact MindPlay has had on BTVI's students.

Meanwhile, **BTVI's President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson**, was grateful to his fellow Rotarians for their support of BTVI and the work the institution does to ultimately bridge the skills gap in the country.

Since the introduction of MindPlay at BTVI in 2019, there have been significant improvements. Results from the spring 2020 semester revealed that 69% of students advanced one or more reading levels.

BTVI Recruits Students Virtually

While the virtual open houses have been wellattended, Ms. Key prefers to have face-to-face interactions with prospective students and is anxious to return to her normal routine. This included hosting recruitment exercises in Abaco, Andros, Freeport, Exuma, Bimini, Cat Island and Eleuthera.

Meanwhile, BTVI's President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson, was one of the key personnel making presentations during the live engagements. Dr. Robertson is an advocate for online and distance learning, and is impressed by the amount of prospective students the institution has reached during the virtual open houses.

BTVI to Offer Hospitality Program

The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) will soon begin offering a Hospitality Certificate, approved by City and Guilds.

The pilot program will offer introductory courses in Hospitality, Hospitality Management, Tourism Marketing, and Strategic Tourism Marketing. Each course will be delivered through the virtual learning platform for up to 48-guided learning hours for four weeks. Digital badges are attached to the certificates.

The programs' development took place over six months, with BTVI's Dean of Student Affairs, Racquel Bethel, serving as the Instructional Design Lead. She and her team worked along with the City and Guilds Assured Consultant, stationed at the Trinidad office.

The courses met the City and Guilds' Assured Benchmark Standards, which included, but were not limited to health and safety, academic resources, teaching/learning assessments, management systems, recruitment, and support services.

According to the Assured Benchmark report, BTVI has a "...well-established quality management system which has allowed for the incorporation of the Assured program to model best practice." It confirmed that this is evidenced by the institution's,

"continuous improvement in strategies, policies, procedures, and practices within the organization."

Dean Bethel pointed to the significance of the Tourism Marketing certificate, which provides an overview of the role marketing and promotion play in the hospitality industry's strategic plan. It outlines the marketing fundamentals required in the planning and promotion of an event or a destination.

BTVI's President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson, lauded Dean Bethel for what he considered "stellar representation" of the institution in bringing the City and Guilds' offerings to BTVI.

The rebranding also includes the offering of international certifications. Certifications include Microsoft Office Suites Word, Excel, PowerPoint and Access, along with Internet Core Competency Certification (IC3), Certiport Entrepreneurship and the Associate Professional in Human Resources (APHR) certification which is soon to be added.

Further, one of the new programs is the institution's **Entrepreneurship program**, which is 34 weeks long for full-time students with 15 transferrable credits.

Meanwhile, Chair of Business Studies and Entrepreneurship, Kerima Smith, is responsible for the department's shift of including Entrepreneurship as one of its disciplines. Ms. Smith has long been an advocate for business ownership and often encourages her students to explore it. She said at the

end of the program, graduates will be more equipped to successfully start a new business or build upon their current business ventures.

The Business Studies and Entrepreneurship department's mission is to create value for its students and for businesses locally and globally, through educational activities that will lead to career success and the advancement of their professional growth. Its vision is to be seen as a leader in education through knowledge creation, contemporary programs and extraordinary experiences.

To date, over 134 persons have completed the NCCER Craft Instructor Certification workshop in The Bahamas, while more

than 573 students have completed the core program, which has nine modules taught during 80 contact hours.

The NCCER is an internationally recognized accrediting body that has designed standardized training and credentialing programs for more than 70 craft areas. It is an initiative by the Bahamas government to build the Bahamian skills gap and ensure employability.

NCCER is considered the training, assessment, certification and career development standard for construction and maintenance craft professionals. It is recognized in 20 countries and 50 of the United States.





The customized Freeport Container Port program in Mechanical Technology ended in December 2020 with seven of the remaining eight apprentices successfully completing the Level 3 Diploma in Maintenance, Installation, and **Commissioning** through City and Guilds.

Seven Hutchison Ports FCP apprentices passed the City and Guilds Level 3 Principles of Engineering Maintenance, Installation and Commissioning diploma offered through the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI).

Students studied subjects such as Physics, Advanced Math, Advanced Science, Fabrication and Hydraulics, and Welding. The diploma is the equivalent of an associate's degree.

Veteran Educator Lauds BTVI Trajectory

Just outside of Manchester, England is Bolton. It's an old style northern industrial town. It was where Graham Thornley was born and raised, and it was while in high school there that his interest in technical vocational education and training (TVET) was ignited.

Mr. Thornley has now been teaching for 52 years — over half a century. This veteran educator received his three-year teacher training at **Alsager College**, which was a part of **Keele University** back then. He then embarked on his teaching career at **Brownlow High School** and shortly thereafter came to The Bahamas.

1975 was the year Mr. Thornley's journey in The Bahamas began. He was posted at **R. M. Bailey Senior High School** where he taught carpentry. He stayed there until November 1987, ending a 12-year tenure to venture into business and then employment in the private sector. It was during that time, a workshop he opened was responsible for building seven gazebos along the touristic Cable Beach strip. He, along with **Peter Briggs**, played instrumental roles in the project which dotted the popular area.

Mr. Thornley's love for teaching was still churning within, so in 1993, he applied to teach at the **Industrial Training College (ITC)**, which is now the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI). He has given 28

years of his life to the institution and has never looked back.

"I'm a lifelong teacher. It's what I do. It's what I enjoy. My connections with students are not transient. They become lifelong. Some of my students, I've gotten jobs for; others have come back and taught at BTVI as part-time instructors," said Mr. Thornley.

In fact, one of Mr. Thornley's R. M. Bailey students, Alexander Darville, is now Dean of Construction Trades and Workforce Development at BTVI.

While at the institution, Mr. Thornley has been a part of several community initiatives, including **Cans for Kids**, an aluminum recycling program; he designed and created a podium and stand for nearby school, **Claridge Primary** and he and his students built a money box, which was stationed in the Nassau cruise port's welcome center – a BTVI partnership with the **Rotary Club of Nassau Sunrise** to assist with the club's community efforts.

In recent years, Mr. Thornley has been one of the instructors chosen to participate in the Citizen Security and Justice Program (CSJP), which is a part of a \$3.4 million component of an Inter-American Development Bank-financed joint venture with the Ministry of National Security and BTVI. The goal is to train 600 inmates in several disciplines,

which is expected to assist with their reintegration into society.

"I never felt in the slightest bit vulnerable. The inmates were always well behaved. Any trepidation was unfounded," said Mr. Thornley, who along with other BTVI instructors went to the prison for two mornings per week over 10 weeks.

"We gave them basic skills that were job-centric. Hopefully when they get on the outside, they employ those skills. It doesn't matter where they start. They can start as labourers on a job site, but they can work their way up through their performance, reliability, turning up every day, their willingness to learn and apply themselves. There is always the possibility of taking on more responsibilities," said Mr. Thornley.

Meanwhile, Mr. Thornley is also one of the instructors for BTVI's accelerated training towards **National Centre for Construction Education and Research (NCCER)** certification.

"The NCCER course is well thought out. Presently, it lends itself to the online method because of the pandemic, but these are short, intense courses and participants are encouraged to follow up with additional courses. It's a throwback to the old apprenticeship system. It's very inviting. I like BTVI's trajectory. I like NCCER. It prepares them for the world of work," said Mr. Thornley.

The Rise of Information Teachnology

When Yolande Samuels-Cole joined Team BTVI in July 2019, she was an adjunct instructor working with the Information and Communications Technology (ICT) program in Grand Bahama. Her knowledge, skills and drive have been so impressive, that today, she is the institution's Online Learning Coordinator, with additional responsibilities as the solo person in the Grand Bahama IT department.

Her expertise became even more apparent in March 2020 when she played an instrumental role as a part of the core team members of BTVI's new Centre for Online and **Distance Education (CODE).** They were responsible for moving some 450 classes to an online format at the onset of the national lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a mammoth task achieved over a 72-hour period using the Moodle learning management system. She also conducted training of BTVI faculty for Zoom and the virtual learning environment (VLE) in preparation for the new normal. She is proud of the team that made it happen.

"The world is changing and I'm happy BTVI has embraced it, particularly as a country with so many family islands. We are now more open to those who have a thirst for vocational training. A lot of people got displaced by Hurricane Dorian; now, they don't have to be on one of our campuses. They can be anywhere and receive the same level of education," said Ms. Samuels-Cole.

"I understand the significance of

students around The Bahamas now being able to access vocational courses from BTVI, the nation's leader in technical vocational education and training (TVET)," she added.

Ms. Cole noted that a virtual education does not put students at a disadvantage, particularly as the institution uses **Microsoft TestOut**, which provides simulations and **NetAcad**, **Cisco's Network Academy**.

"Our students still get hands-on experiences. These are systems used at universities worldwide," she underscored.

Meanwhile, Ms. Samuels-Cole has 19 years of experience in teaching from grade one to adults. She has a teacher's diploma in Secondary Education in Math and Computer Science from the Joint Board of Education of Jamaica and a Bachelor's of Education in Secondary Education and Computer Science from the University of the West Indies (UWI). Her teaching practice was at two vocational schools in Jamaica. The IT professional is currently taking a break from studying towards a master's degree in Instructional Design and Technology with UWI online; however, she is in full swing studying for a Cisco **DevNet** associate's degree.


A proud member of the team headed by **Dean of Information Technology and Distance Education, Anthony Ramtulla,** Ms. Samuels-Cole is a proponent of certification. Although this push for certification focuses on students, the team leads by example by ensuring they too are certified. Ms. Samuels-Cole has attained many certifications during her two-year employment at BTVI, including but not limited to Cisco Certified Network Associate 1 (CNNA1), Pearson VUE Proctor, Microsoft Trainer certificates and a National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) instructor. She is currently working towards her CCNA2 of which the concentration is on switching and routing.

Experienced in virtual learning before the pandemic, Ms. Samuels-Cole worked on her bachelor's degree online while working in Bimini. As a student and instructor in the virtual world, she believes every subject area should have a level of IT integration, particularly for the delivery of content in an interactive manner. In fact, she was a member of the Ministry of Education's Tech Coach team while working for the Catholic Board of Education. She also got the opportunity to attend the 2019 **Future of Educational Technology** Conference (FETC) in Orlando, Florida.

In the interim, Ms. Samuels-Cole is adamant about extending a helping hand to her colleagues; she passes on her knowledge and does so passionately.

Questioned as to what is her 'Why' for teaching, Ms. Samuels-Cole responded: "Seeing my students succeed in what they do. I love being a part of the process of leading others to a brighter future."





'Briland Boy' Passionate about Certifications

For **Alexander Darville**, working at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) is not just a job. *It's a lifestyle*.

One conversation with Mr. Darville, who is **Dean of Construction Trades** and Workforce Development, and his passion for the trades reverberates. His love for technical vocational education and training (TVET), and playing an instrumental role in imparting those skills to others is evident. He goes after each project with precision and sees it to completion.

He credits that drive to having grown up with a hardworking father on **Harbour Island** – **locally called, 'Briland'**. He started earning a paycheck at the age of 10.

From BTVI's **Dual Enrollment** to **Jump** Start programs and the Citizen Security and Justice Program (CSJP) to the **National Center for Construction** Education and Research (NCCER). Mr. Darville is enthusiastic about workforce development. Mr. Darville, who has worked at BTVI for the past 12 years, has also been key in the institution offering Journeyman Plumbing, Master Plumbing and ensuring all construction and mechanical trade students are Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) certified. This is in addition to being on the team which compiled the necessary documents for BTVI's City and Guilds application review, while managing the process.

"I believe in seeing things from a global perspective. I believe the credentials we give out must have that global spin to it," stated the 1989 Basic Electrical graduate of BTVI, which was known as the **Industrial Training College (ITC)** back then.

A determined Mr. Darville went on to earn his Single and 3 Phase Electrical licenses; he eventually received the opportunity to teach these two courses while employed at the College of The Bahamas – now University of The Bahamas.

"I am passionate about people becoming certified. We need more trained people. On some islands, there is only one electrician, one carpenter. This is why we are excited that we have virtually introduced NCCER certification to several islands. Residents will also eventually be able to assist with their own domestic needs," said Mr. Darville.

Additionally, Mr. Darville's portfolio includes a stint with the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), having served as Skills Development Specialist between the IDB and Bahamas Ministry of Labour - a project in connection with BTVI. The University of the West Indies (UWI) graduate holds a Bachelor's Degree in Construction Management with a minor in Security Management Richmond from University, and numerous technical and vocational certifications. He is also a member of the International **Association of Electrical Inspectors** (IAEI).

"I love when I take a novice, see him go out and then invest back and build someone else. No money can replace that. BTVI saves a lot of people. We play a crucial role in fixing socioeconomic issues in the country. I love the opportunity to advise students and eventually see them turn around, then walk across the stage. It's gratifying," he stressed.

Earlier in 2021, Mr. Darville and Dr. Robertson co-authored a research paper for a publication of the **Florida Political Chronicle**; it outlined efforts of the institution in advancing workforce skills, following the hurricane Dorian-ravaged northern islands, while simultaneously competing in a COVID-19 environment.

Further, in summer 2019, for the first time in BTVI's history, Mr. Darville was among three employees, who had the opportunity to present papers at the **fourth annual international conference on TVET,** held in Jamaica. His presentation was on *Working to Learn a Skill: The Apprenticeship Model for The Bahamas*.

"Technology is changing and there is movement of people. It's a demographic shift. We have to train and re-train. We have to re-tool people to take on new jobs," he stated.

The little boy from Briland, who is a fishing enthusiast and enjoys farming to the point he actually has one in the back of his yard, is a firm believer that the future of work is about obtaining certifications in a globally competitive world. He said whether on Harbour Island or New Providence, BTVI is determined to help as many people as possible to become certified in this technologically-advanced age.




