### Message from the President





### 1,000 Scholarships Available At BTVI

In August 2018, the government, through the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI), announced the offering of 1,000 scholarships to students enrolled in full-time programs inclusive of preparatory, certificate, diploma and associate degrees.

The scholarships are geared towards providing students with the requisite technical and vocational skills to start businesses and/or secure employment, and address the national skills gap.



### Innovative IT Youth Program Paves Way for Tech Hub

One hundred and twenty three students from private and public schools in New Providence were awarded certificates in fall of 2018 after completing phase one of the government's Information and Communication Technology (ICT) program that began that summer and spans across three summers.

The ICT program is the brainchild of Prime Minister, the Most Honourable Dr. Hubert Minnis. There were 175 students combined between the program in New Providence and Grand Bahama. The students who were heading into 10th grade, were given

the opportunity to gain hands-on training, college credits and international certifications at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI).

The program is headed by BTVI's Dean of Information Technology and Online Education, Anthony Ramtulla, who believes the seed has been planted for participants to become the leading experts in Software Engineering, Network Engineering and Information Technology Management in the nation.

A student of The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) in Grand Bahama was among 14 individuals awarded grants by the government for up to \$5,000 to start businesses.

Curlene Bain, a grandmother of seven, got a step closer to launching FastCrafts Fast Ferry & Water Taxi Services, thanks to the Grand Bahama Micro and Small Business Economic Empowerment and Entrepreneurial Incentive Program.

The self-starter program empowers Bahamians 18 to 30 to establish small businesses, providing funding between \$1,000 and \$5,000 to acquire tools and supplies for their businesses. Funds are paid directly to the supplier.

The journey for Curlene began while in a BTVI Entrepreneurial Workforce Prep class in spring 2018. As one of the requirements of the class was a business plan, Ms. Bain approached her instructor, Sherlock Prince, to help turn that class project into a submission for the government program.

### BTVI Strengthens City and Guilds Internal Framework



Twenty-seven staff and faculty from the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) attended training sessions which focused on City and Guilds' assessment and quality assurance in fall 2019.

The four-day training session in New Providence came as BTVI further readies itself to offer City and Guilds courses and exams after it secured accreditation from the UK-based London institute. Freeport Container Port apprentices started the program in October 2017 in preparation for sitting the City and Guilds Level 3 Diploma in Engineering Maintenance, Installation and Commissioning.

Attending the workshop, conducted by City and Guilds' internal verifier, Professor Gossett Oliver, were the chairs of the trades at BTVI and faculty.

City and Guilds offers a wide range of vocational qualifications in several occupational areas, ranging across eight levels - from entry to high-order - which are designed for cross-border employment. City and Guilds has a presence in more than 80 countries and is considered one of the leading skills development organizations.

### 20 New Grand Bahama Shipyard Apprentices Join BTVI

The Grand Bahama Shipyard launched its 2018 apprenticeship cohort with 20 students attending the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI).

Courses include Good Housekeeping, Incident Reporting, Safety, Basic Industry Information and Procedures at the Shipyard. They also have classes in basic draftsman skills and the use of relevant materials. After four years of training and upon successful completion of the program, the apprentices will be offered positions such as Engine Mechanics, Welders, Pipefitters and Electricians.

The shipyard and BTVI began its partnership in 1994. Over the years, this partnership has churned out some 100 professionally trained tradesmen. The apprenticeship program was launched with the purpose of replacing and significantly lowering the expatriate workforce at the shipyard.

The Grand Bahama Shipyard is one of the largest shipyards in the region with more than 800 employees.

### Students Lose Math Fear via Web-Based Learning

The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) has been using Internet-based learning systems to reduce the fear of Mathematics among its students.

The Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces (ALEKS) system is a web-based, artificially intelligent assessment system. It uses adaptive questioning to quickly and accurately determine what a student knows and does not know in a Math course.

The system allows instructors to create lessons based on their course outlines. Upon the students' initial log-in, they are given a knowledge test to assess what topics they have mastered and what topics they need to work on.

Based on those results, ALEKS creates a personal learning plan that teaches and assesses students' mastery of content and skills. The system also regularly tests and retests the same skills to make sure students retain knowledge.

Since its implementation in spring 2017, the overall Math pass rate has steadily increased every semester. More than 80 students received awards from ALEKS in April 2018. The Math withdrawals decreased by 50% compared to the previous year, marking the lowest ever withdrawal rate at that point.


### Prison Inmates Graduate from BTVI Program

More than 100 inmates were a part of the first cohort of the Citizen Security and Justice Program held at The Bahamas Department of Corrections. They received training in a wide array of areas, including Electrical Installation, Hair Dressing, Information Technology, Garment Manufacturing and Auto Mechanics.

The program is funded by a \$3.4m Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) loan. Upon release, these certificates will also allow participants to enroll in BTVI to further their education.

The training courses used existing curricula and participants were assessed by BTVI instructors in a manner commensurate with students on its main campus. The vocational training is followed by three months of work experience in maintenance and repair on the prison compound.

To ensure sustainability of the program, six correctional officers are undergoing training, which will equip them to function as certified vocational instructors at BTVI, working within the prison environment on a full-time basis.

For the second consecutive year, the executives at ARM Caribbean Limited invested in its employees by awarding nine of them the opportunity to complete a specialized training program at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTV).

ARM is a heating ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) design and contracting firm and is owned by Bahamians. The company is responsible for the completion of the HVAC work at Fusion Superplex.

Between January and December 2018, the nine employees studied Electrical Installation I, AC/DC Circuits and HVAC I and II. The cohort attended classes four days per week for three-and-a half hours.

With a shortage of some of the basic competencies needed for the local workforce, a technical vocational education and training (TVET) Day was hosted by the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) in February 2019.

Students from various schools were present at the event held at the institution's Old Trail Road campus. It included a panel discussion with industry professionals.

Later in the ceremony, Minister of Education, the Honourable Jeffrey Lloyd presented City and Guilds' teaching, training and assessor certificates to 26 faculty members who successfully passed the course.

BTVI's President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson described it as a watershed moment for the institution, as it has begun offering the internationally-recognized City and Guilds'

courses at its Grand Bahama campus. Also, six apprentices from the Freeport Container Port passed Level 3 Engineering Health and Safety and Level 3 Engineering Principles, which are a part of Level 3 Diploma in Engineering. Students would have studied subjects such as Physics, Advance Math, Welding and, Fabrication and Hydraulics.

### MindPlay

The trial version of a virtual reading program, which analyzes individual students' reading strengths and weaknesses was introduced to the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) during the spring 2019 semester.

MindPlay gives students a pretest, builds a unique plan for each student – teaching to the student's specifics gaps – and a post test for each level. Eleven students participated in the seven-day trial, followed by 85 additional students.

BTVI President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson, who described the program as "phenomenal," added that the institution has transformed into one which embraces technology.

### BTVI's Virtual Reading Program Complements Student Learning

The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute's (BTVI) Math department hosted a Math Awareness Week for the first time in its history, bringing attention to the Math challenges faced with its students and beyond its borders.

BTVI has therefore introduced Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces (ALEKS), a web-based, artificially intelligent assessment system. The system allows instructors to create lessons based on their course outlines. On the students' initial log in, they are given a knowledge test to assess what topics they have mastered and what topics they need to work on. Based on those results, ALEKS creates a personal learning plan that teaches and assesses students' mastery of content and skills. The system also regularly tests and retests the same skills to ensure students retain knowledge.

In spring 2018, BTVI students' College Algebra pass rate improved by 12.6% and students dropping Math classes was at an all-time low of 6%.

# Facilitates First International Intern



The Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) facilitated its first international internship in spring 2019, after carpentry student, Odler Pierre, reached out to United States-based Storm Team Construction.

Odler became friends with Storm Team Construction's chief executive, Chad Simkins, through his work at a local marina. He told him about his impending internship and Mr Simkins offered him the opportunity to intern with his company.

Storm Team Construction is a company that specializes in rebuilding and restoration after storms, and has several locations across the US.

The company has received several awards, including the Service Excellence Award by the United Association of Storm Restoration Contractors.

Odler spent five weeks with Storm Team Construction in Jupiter, Florida and completed the required 160 hours for his internship. He was tasked with constructing formwork for concrete walls, constructing stud walls, installing doors, roofs and windows and other related tasks.

He also completed a short online course on installing window and door systems while in Florida.

Then BTVI's Dean of Construction Trades and Workforce Development, Alexander Darville; Chair of Information Technology and Online Education, Anthony Ramtulla and then Chair of Math, Archilene O'Brien presented papers at the fourth annual TVET conference held in Jamaica in 2019.

For the first time in the history of the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute, three of its employees had the opportunity to present papers at the same international conference.

Dean of Construction Trades and Workforce Development, Alexander Darville; then Chair of Information Technology, Anthony Ramtulla and then Chair of Math, Archilene O'Brien, were presenters at the fourth annual international conference on technical vocational education and training (TVET) held in Jamaica in May 2019.

The presentations were on Working to Learn a Skill: The Apprenticeship Model for The Bahamas, Information Communication and Technology Skills for a Global Economy and Making Math Understandable for TVET Students Using Technology: A Case Study of ALEKS.

### Government Offers Tuition Grant for BTVI



Bahanas Technical & Vocational Institute In June 2019, Minister of Education, the Honourable Jeffrey Lloyd, announced in the House of Assembly a government tuition grant to qualified Bahamians to attend the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institution (BTVI) as of the fall 2019. The Be Your Own Boss (BYOB) scholarship became null and void.

The government provided \$4.1 million for the initiative, with the expectation of providing tuition grants to approximately 1,200 students attending or preparing to attend BTVI, which at the time offered programs in New Providence, Grand Bahama, Abaco and Andros.

Recipients were not to be in possession of another award or scholarship at the time of application and the grant could be used for any of the certificate, diploma or associate degree programs offered at BTVI. Professional development courses are excluded.

The tuition grant covers registration fees, tuition, mandatory text books and certification exams, and is only available for the fall and spring semesters each year. Application and graduation fees are excluded.

# BTVI and Georgia State University Forge Ties



President of Georgia State University, Dr. Mark Becker and President of the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI), Dr. Robert W. Robertson, recently signed a Memorandum of Cooperation as BTVI's Chairman, Kevin Basden looks on.

Following a visit by Georgia State University to The Bahamas in October 2019, the institution and the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) have since signed a Memorandum of Cooperation to initiate formal discussions on a collaboration that would afford BTVI students the option to continue their studies at the tier one research institution in Atlanta, Georgia.

The agreement was signed at Georgia State University during a visit by a BTVI delegation including the President, Dr. Robert W. Robertson; Chairman, Kevin Basden; Academic Dean, Dr. Pleshette McPhee and Dean of Student Services, Racquel Bethel.

The agreement will also facilitate discussions on the development of faculty training opportunities for BTVI instructors, as well as faculty and student exchanges. Georgia State University's Associate Provost for International Initiatives, Dr. Wolfgang Schlör, hosted the delegation.

### BTVI has spearheaded several important national initiatives in 2018 - 2019, keeping with its mission to become globally competitive:

- \* The government announced it would be providing \$4.1 million for a tuition grant to approximately 1,200 students attending or preparing to attend BTVI.
- \* The government's Information and Communication Technology (ICT) program for high schoolers in Grand Bahama and New Providence, accepted its second cohort. Between the returning cohort and the new cohort, 400 students were enrolled in the program through which students completed first-year college courses in Python, JavaScript, HTML, CSS, Cyber-security, Professional performance and the Internet of Things.
- \* BTVI became a City and Guilds approved centre. This accreditation also gives BTVI a competitive advantage as City and Guilds' certifications are globally-recognized and accepted. Twenty seven faculty members were in a four-day training session which focused on City and Guilds' assessment and quality assurance.
- \* BTVI reached the half-way mark of training 600 inmates in several disciplines via the Citizen Security and Justice program. The program, launched in 2018, is a part of a \$3.4 million component of an Inter-American Development Bank-financed joint venture with the Ministry of National Security and BTVI. Its focus is to provide skills to those reintegrating into society.
- \* BTVI participated in the Ministry of Public Service's National Job Skills and Empowerment Program (NJSEP), retaining the services of some of the participants at its completion.



### BTVI Grand Bahama and Abaco teams impacted by Hurricane Dorian

Thirty-five students from the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute's (BTVI) Abaco and Grand Bahama campuses transferred to its New Providence campus following hurricane Dorian in September 2019. To officially welcome the students, the institution held a luncheon in their honour where they sat and ate with members of the senior management team including the chairman and president.

Hurricane Dorian left BTVI's Grand Bahama campuses severely damaged which led to classes being suspended. The Grand Bahama ground floor experienced a surge of water up to eight feet. It was gutted and the administration began working out of make-shift offices on the second floor of the main building located on Peach Tree Street and Settlers Way.

During the luncheon, organized by the Student Affairs department, the group received care packages from BTVI, Silvia 'Bibi' Borges of Florida National University (FNU) and the entire FNU team. The group also received t-shirts with the words 'BTVI Strong' inscribed.

Before classes resumed on Grand Bahama on October 7th, a Welcome Back Breakfast was held for faculty and staff at Mary Ann's Restaurant. Sponsored by Bahamas First Insurance, it buoyed the spirits of the team. It was followed by the distribution of goods and food on campus. Meantime, classes were held on the second floor of the main building. They were also held at St. George's High School on Sunset Highway. BTVI used five classrooms at the high school, in addition to the electrical, auto mechanics, cosmetology and welding labs. Those classes were held in the evenings and on Saturdays.

Meanwhile, BTVI operated a centre out of Patrick Bethel Senior High School in Abaco. However, the school was pummeled and there is no indication of operations resuming any time soon.

Overall, 70 students from Grand Bahama and Abaco either transferred or were enrolled in BTVI New Providence for the first time, since the hurricane.



### BTVI Launches Enhancement Project-





The \$9.3 million BTVI Enhancement Project was launched in October, 2019. \$4.74 million or 51% of the project is being financed via a loan by the Caribbean Development Bank. \$4.56 million or 49% is being provided directly by The Bahamas government. The project is expected to be completed in 2021.

- Enhancement of Student Affairs Services at BTVI;
- Enhancement of Crime Prevention and Campus Security;
- · Preparation of a BTVI Campus Master Plan;
- Support to successfully implement Renewable Energy/Energy Efficiency initiatives on the Nassau and Freeport campuses;
- Preparation of a Maintenance Policy and Plan for BTVI;
- Design and supervision services for rehabilitation of workshops and laboratories at BTVI.

#### RBC Royal Bank Makes Major Investment in BTVI





RBC Race for the Kids, which is a global charitable event, was held in The Bahamas in January 2020. Thousands of dollars were raised as RBC Royal Bank and the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute's (BTVI) staff, faculty, students, alumni and the general public raced for the kids.

All proceeds go directly to BTVI to assist with:

- 1) Rebuilding our Grand Bahama campus and Abaco centre in the wake of unprecedented damage caused during hurricane Dorian
- 2) Introduction of our Success Tracking and Resource (STAR) program for at-risk students and
- 3) Upgrades to our Student Success Learning Lab, inclusive of wireless capabilities.

Several fundraisers were held, including but not limited to the RBC Runway to 5K Soirée and Alumni Reception held at The Island House. The Bahamas is the third country in which the RBC Race for the Kids has been held.







#### BTVI to Host New EducationUSA Advising Center







The United States (US) Embassy and the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) signed a Memorandum of Understanding agreeing to make BTVI host of the new EducationUSA Advising Center in The Bahamas as of 2020. The center will be the official source of information and guidance for anyone in The Bahamas interested in studying at a college or university in the US.

### BTVI Reveals Skills Gap Survey Results

BTVI, in partnership with the Rotary Club of Nassau Sunrise, hosted a luncheon town hall meeting in January 2020 to discuss the results of a recent skills gap survey conducted in The Bahamas. According to the results, 62% of employers stated that local employees are not globally competitavie and 65% highlighted numeracy and literacy skills gaps.

The survey was based on the 2012 survey conducted by the Inter-American Development Bank in consultation with the Chamber of Commerce.









# BTVI and Valencia College Forge Ties







An 11-member team of officials from the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) visited the Orlando campuses of Valencia College to tour the facilities, as we prepare to rebuild in the aftermath of hurricane Dorian.

The goal of the visit was to learn how to build and equip new facilities aimed at training a strong technical workforce in The Bahamas. BTVI's Abaco centre was demolished by hurricane Dorian in August 2019 and the Freeport campus was extensively damaged. With funding from the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB) and The Bahamas government, BTVI officials are planning to rebuild and develop training programs to prepare the local workforce to meet the demand for skilled workers who can, in turn, help rebuild the islands' facilities.

The fact-finding mission, which took place on Nov. 18th and 19th, 2019 capped conversations between officials from Valencia College and BTVI, following a visit by Valencia officials to The Bahamas in October of the same year. BTVI officials returned to Valencia in January 2020 for another familiarization tour; this time led by Minister of Education, the Honourable Jeffrey Lloyd. Officials from Valencia then returned to BTVI in March 2020 to discuss Valencia's Accelerated Skills Training (AST) program, which gives students the opportunity to earn industry-recognized credentials, training in essential workplace skills and receive job placement support in a short period of time.

# Commonwealth of Learning and BTVI Sign Training Agreement







The Commonwealth of Learning (COL) and BTVI signed an agreement in 2019 to assist in expanding access to and ensuring the quality of online and blended learning at the school.

In early 2020, over 20 BTVI faculty and staff were in training to design, develop and facilitate quality online courses in the areas of Math, Literacy, Information Technology, Entrepreneurship and Student Success.

Headquartered in Burnaby, Canada, the Commonwealth of Learning is the world's only inter-governmental organization solely concerned with the promotion and development of distance education and open learning.

#### BTVI Instructor Tops UWI-Bahamas Graduates

#### National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) Training

The National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) training for trade instructors was held in July 2020 in Grand Bahama and New Providence. It was a first step in upskilling and providing trade certifications. The accelerated trade training was specifically designed to meet employer needs in the country.

The NCCER develops standardized construction and maintenance curriculum and assessments with portable credentials. These credentials are

tracked through the NCCER's registry system, allowing organizations and companies to verify the qualifications of their craft professionals and/or check the qualifications of possible new hires.

The training and eventual certifications for BTVI students and the institution as a whole, further bolsters our offerings which align with the economy's demands for skilled labour, responding to industry needs. It is commensurate with our institution's vision of "...innovativeness...and high standards in preparing adults for the world of work."

#### Nano Degrees

Nano degrees are now available at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI). They are short, online courses designed to provide quick skills' introduction or a refresher in various areas via an online modality.

After completing any module, students will be awarded a digital badge to prove their achievement. BTVI's digital badges are managed by City & Guilds of London, DigitalMe and are stored in Credly – the world's most trusted credential network on the Blockchain.

The available stacks include: Essential Information Technology, Desktop Application and Productivity, IT Administration and Development Operations, Business and E-commerce.

Online education is a global reality and BTVI has moved to offer quality, certified courses to meet the growing need for technology skills.

Dean Bethel has served in the capacity of senior administrator for the past 11 years at BTVI. She oversees multiple support service areas including Career Services, Student Life, Student Advocacy, Counseling, Health and Wellness Services, Student Retention, along with the BTVI Childcare and Learning Resource Centre.

According to Ms. Bethel, the evolution of higher education is ongoing and to address the varied needs of a growing society, we must commit to readying ourselves for constant change. At BTVI, the Office of Student Affairs is committed to growth and change. Therefore, the unit is ardent about providing responsive and relevant programs and services to address the immediate and long-term needs of the growing student population.

Under Dean Bethel's direction, the unit launched several change initiatives, which have directly impacted the institute's retention and persistence efforts. Through the implementation of the intrusive advising and service-learning concepts, BTVI now ensures that every incoming student receives one-on-one success advising and career planning assistance to chart his or her course towards program completion and transition - either directly into the workforce or toward further studies. In addition, students learn the importance of giving back to their communities. Over the past two years, BTVI students have logged-in over 16,500 hours of community service throughout The Bahamas.

This initiative has impacted academic growth and student success both inside and outside of the classroom and has promoted the BTVI mission to foster "globally competitive and economically independent" citizens.

Being the visionary person she is, in March 2018, Ms. Bethel and her team introduced to The Bahamas and BTVI, the internationally recognized Clothesline Project which promotes breaking the silence on sexual and domestic violence against women. Under the patronage of the wife of the prime minister and supported by the World Health and the Pan American Health Organizations, BTVI joined the global campaign. The impactful exhibit made up of t-shirts created by survivors of violence or in honor of someone who experienced violence, was a powerful display of the abusive reality that many live.

BTVI's Student Affairs department is committed to bringing awareness to social causes. Its affiliation with organizations such as the Zonta Club of New Providence is yet another example of its dedication. For the past 10 years, BTVI and Zonta have teamed-up to provide training and development opportunities for single and unemployed women throughout the nation's capital. The summer retraining program sponsored by the Zonta Club of New Providence has hosted over 100 women. These ladies completed training, many enrolled in programs of study at BTVI or University of The Bahamas, and have advanced to become contributing members of society. These are among the many ways that Ms. Bethel seeks to promote growth and change throughout the BTVI community.

Dean Bethel is undoubtedly passionate about the advancement of students. Her 22 years of experience in the field of higher education have afforded her tremendous knowledge, skills and exposure. Before returning to The Bahamas in 2006, she spent nearly 10 years at Daytona State College working at the on-campus Small Business Development Center, and later, the campus' Women's Center. She obtained her undergraduate degree in International Business from Bethune–Cookman University and then completed a Master's degree in Organizational Leadership and Learning at Barry University.



Anthony Ramtulla, Dean of Information Technology and Online Education at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute, embodies the instructor/mentor model as he shows concern for his students, while inspiring them to go beyond the ordinary. He inspires critical and analytical thinking and fully supports troubleshooting and exploratory learning as opposed to the antiquated desk and book system.

With over 20 years of teaching experience in areas of Mathematics, Electronics, Physics and Information Technology, Mr. Ramtulla branched out into networking, systems administration and software development. He holds a Bachelor's of Science degree in Physics and Electronics (with Honours), a Master's degree in Business Administration and he is completing a Graduate Certificate from Howard University.

It was under his watch that BTVI was recognized for obtaining the highest results in the Computing Technology Industry Association (CompTIA) exams taken at 40 testing centres throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. CompTIA is a leader in the Information Technology (IT) industry worldwide, issuing professional certifications. BTVI has over 300 students taking CompTIA exams annually.

"In sheer volume of taking exams and passing them, we are on top. We have adopted CompTIA's standards. They produce a syllabus that changes every three years; it is therefore relevant," said Mr. Ramtulla.

As an avid enterprise level software developer with industry IT certifications from CompTIA and teaching qualifications from Cisco, it is a part of Mr. Ramtulla's mandate to have his faculty members on the cutting edge of technology through training and networking with experts throughout the country. All members of his team have received or are receiving their credentials as certified trainers.

Under Mr. Ramtulla's leadership, BTVI's IT department has become an official CompTIA Authorized Academy, Cisco Networking Academy, Cisco Instructor Trainer Centre and Academy Support Centre, and a Red Hat Academy. These academic partnerships enable BTVI to offer certified training at an international level.

Mr. Ramtulla continues to be a forward thinker. Hence, a curriculum review resulted in BTVI now offering a set of new and optimized IT programs since fall 2017. The National Accreditation and Equivalency Council of The Bahamas (NAECOB) approved programs include Associate of Applied Science degrees in Network Engineering, Software Engineering and a redesigned Information Technology Management degree. This is in addition to an IT Support Specialist diploma and an IT Entry Level certificate program.

"We changed the paradigm. We are meeting and exceeding standards, and our record speaks for itself," he stated.

As a lifelong learner, Mr. Ramtulla continues his professional development and currently has completed multiple graduate courses. He is very interested in online education in The Bahamas and has written and presented internationally on the subject (Digital Universities International Best Practices and Applications). Further, in May 2019, Mr. Ramtulla presented a paper at the fourth annual Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) conference held in Jamaica; his research was on Information Communication and Technology Skills for a Global Economy.

# NORTHERN CAMPUS UPDATE

#### Human Resources Highlights

The institution continued with supportive and vibrant instructors and staff, who saw no problem with filling in wherever needed. The ICT program, which was launched in 2018 summer, proved financially and publically beneficial for the Grand Bahama campus. It is a three-year program expected to continue until summer 2020 with respect to new intakes – however, the final intake will not be completed until summer 2022.

Additionally, there was a 100% enrollment in the IT program at BTVI Freeport as a result of this program.

#### Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) Enrollment

Continued to enroll private institutions in OSHA courses through professional development.

#### Grand Bahama Shipyard





We continued to accommodate the Grand Bahama Shipyard program in fall 2018, but it was done using a different approach. Twenty apprentices were accommodated.

The apprentices followed specially requested courses from the Grand Bahama Shipyard: Basic Draftsman Skills for Grand Bahama Shipyard, Basic Industry and Procedures for Grand Bahama Shipyard, Basic Shipyard Use of Relevant Materials at Grand Bahama Shipyard, Good Housekeeping and Incident Reporting at Grand Bahama Shipyard and Safety at Grand Bahama Shipyard. BTVI used its collection of industry experience to ensure the apprentices were exposed to relevant topics.



#### Freeport Container Port





The customized Freeport Container Port program in Mechanical Technology continued. The program focused on preparing the apprentices for qualifications at Level 3 Diploma in Maintenance, Installation and Commissioning through City and Guilds. Eight apprentices were enrolled.

Intense preparation had begun for the summer 2019 external examinations. Overall, 50% completed successfully. The other 50% were scheduled to enroll in review classes to complete successfully.

#### Ministry of Youth Fresh Start Program



A session was done in spring 2019 with approximately 60 students. In addition to their majors, the students enrolled in Student Success, OSHA (technology and general maintenance students) and IT Fundamentals certification (technology students). The highlight for the technology students was that they all received the IT Fundamentals certification.

The students spent 12 weeks in the following subject areas and were later sent out for on-the-job training:

- Welding
- General Maintenance (Electrical, Carpentry, Masonry and Plumbing)
- Acrylic Nails/Cosmetology
- Computer Technology

#### Student Government

The Student Government Association (SGA) was revived fall 2018 led by its President, Del-LaMarr Davis. Many activities, including a basketball tournament were organized by this energetic team.



#### Other

- · Six robotic kits were donated to BTVI by Kettering University
- The Rotary Club of Lucaya and its partners became instrumental in the Grand Bahama Science Club having a home base, which allowed for college-level students and faculty to become engaged. Students learned skills on building robots and electronics, while building critical thinking skills and working as a team.
